

Goal 1: Develop & Implement a Housing First Program in Chilliwack

Establish a coordinated system for moving people from homelessness or unsafe housing to housing that they can afford, and that is safe and appropriate for their needs, as quickly as possible, providing the necessary wrap around medical and social services to help them stay housed and improve their health over time.

Plan Implementation

ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES IN HOUSING

MUNICIPAL

- Establishes affordable housing policy, bylaws & zoning
- Advocates for funding from senior levels of government
- Fee waivers and tax exemptions for non-profit housing

PROVINCIAL

- Funds housing projects, homeless outreach, rent subsidies, income assistance, health & social services
- Regulates assisted living housing and community care facilities

FRASER HEALTH

 Plans, funds, implements mental health, addiction prevention, withdrawal management

FEDERAL

- Homelessness Partnering Strategy (housing & programs) for designated or rural communities
- CMHC market reports & mortgage loan insurance

HOUSING & SERVICE PROVIDERS

- Initiate, sponsor, operate housing projects
- Delivers services

COMMUNITY

- Provides donations and volunteer time with non profits
- Assists with community acceptance of new housing projects
